Why Toddlers Ignore Us

They're Smart

Toddlers learn quickly. If they realize that raising their voice works, they'll wait until that moment to comply.

They're Testing Boundaries

Toddlers are exploring their independence and figuring out what they can and cannot do.

Get Their Attention First

- 1 Eliminate Distractions

 Pause screens, remove toys, and get on their level.
- Make Eye Contact

 This ensures they are focused on you.





Use Clear, Positive Instructions

Be Specific

Instead of "Don't run," say, "Please walk."

Be Positive

Instead of "Do you want to clean up?" say, "It's time to clean up."

Follow Through with Consequences



Enforce the consequence right away, not after repeated warnings.



If they keep throwing a toy after being asked to stop, remove the toy and explain why.



Prepare Them for Transitions

Prepare

Let them know what's coming next.

Motivate

Say, "First, pack up your toys, then we'll go to the park."



Model the Behavior You Expect

1

Show, Don't Tell

If you ask them to put away toys, put one away yourself.

2

Wait

Wait for your child to follow your example.





Consistency is Key

It takes time for toddlers to learn new behaviors. Be patient and consistent, and they'll learn to listen the first time.
