Tired of giving instructions that fall on deaf ears? Here's a proven plan to guide your toddler to follow directions, built on the principles of effective communication and development.



Step 1: Capture Their Attention

Walk Over

Instead of calling from across the room, approach them directly.

Crouch Down

Get down to their level to make a connection and show respect.

Make Eye Contact

Say their name and wait for them to look at you before giving the instruction.



Step 2: Minimize Distractions

Clear the Area

Remove enticing toys, screens, or other distractions.

Turn Off Noise

Silence background sounds to help them focus on your voice.



Step 3: Speak Their Language

Use Short Commands

Avoid complex sentences and use clear, simple instructions.

Be Specific

Instead of "Clean up," say "Put the blocks in the box."

Age-Appropriate Steps

Start with one-step instructions and gradually add complexity as they mature.

Step 4: Confidently Communicate



Calm and Confident

A calm, assertive tone creates a sense of security.



Positive Body Language

Maintain eye contact, smile, and use gestures to emphasize your words.



Step 5: Give Them Time to Process

Wait

Allow 7-10 seconds for them to understand and respond.

Praise

Acknowledge their efforts immediately with positive feedback.





Step 6: Gently Guide When Needed

Repeat

Reiterate the instruction, simplifying if necessary.

Demonstrate

Use gestures to clearly show what you want them to do.

Assist

If they still need help, offer a gentle hand to guide them.
